Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan March 2025 Progress Report

- Cocoa Beach McNabb Outfall Bioretention project completed
- Sent notice of funding to approved 2025 Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project applicants
- Quick Connects 15 more reimbursements processed of 458 to date; 530 agreements executed
- Septic Upgrades 8 more reimbursements processed of 378 to date; 642 total agreements executed
- Oyster monitoring by University of Central Florida at 3 months, the Turkey Creek Offshore project had an average density of 2,820 live oysters per square meter with approximately 22.8% being adult sized; at 18-months, the McNabb project had 7 oysters per square meter for the prisms seeded with gardened oysters, 95.2 oysters per square meter for the prisms seeded with spat-on-shell and 111 oysters per square meter for the gabions seeded with spat-on-shell
- Contracts executed 24-259 Ramp Road Park Stormwater Improvements and 25-69 Apollo General Aviation Baffle Box
- Videos River Groves Community Challenge Garden, Titusville Causeway Shoreline Restoration
